Why we have houden van in Dutch:

It's basically the same as in English when you say thinking of or reminding of. But then we have 3 words that we use, and we *always* use it. The words are: van, naar, and aan.

For example: houden van (loves), kijken naar (looks), and herinneren aan (remembering). So in English you have the same, but in English you only use it often, and you only have one word.
